

Cochin IMA and Kerala Association of Neurologists (KAN) Observed World Stroke Day 2014

Summary of Stroke CME (see photographs), compiled by Dr Vivek Nambiar

World stroke day symposium was conducted at the Cochin IMA by Kerala Association of Neurologists. The panel of expert neurologists delivered talks on different topics and the session was moderated by Dr Mathew Abraham.

Theme of the year for stroke day was Women and Stroke. This point was highlighted by the panelists. Even though the incidence of vascular events are less in females in the premenopausal time the incidence of stroke is high in the peripartum, pregnancy and postmenopausal periods of the life.

Infact, stroke kills and disables more women compared to breast cancer. The quality of care given to female stroke patient and the outcome of female stroke patients are not as good as males in society. Various aspects of the stroke prevention and treatment were discussed.

Acute stroke diagnosis and treatment is a challenge as it is time bound and hence every potential delay should be reduced as far as possible to improve the outcome..

The time-window for intravenous thrombolysis is upto 4.5 hours for now, and may even rise upto 5 hours in the coming years due to good data coming in.

Intra arterial treatment can be given upto 6-8

hours, especially mechanical thrombectomy. Different methods of endovascular treatments are available like solitaire retrievable stents and Trevo stents. Evidence for these devices are upcoming and hence the frontline treatment for acute stroke is still intravenous thrombolysis.

Blood pressure would be maintained at under 185/110 for patients with ischemic strokes eligible for thrombolysis.

Intracerebral hemorrhages are eligible for good BP control it may be reduced to 140/90 mmHg, without fear of ischemic damaging the brain even if we reduce the BP.

TIA is a valuable opportunity to intervene and warrants proper imaging and identifying major vessel involvement, critical carotid or basilar stenosis or a ruptured plaque. Stenting or endarterectomy can be done to prevent a

catastrophic stroke.

Surgical treatment for acute stroke - ischemic involves decompressive surgery. It is a life-saving emergency surgery to reduce the effect of brain swelling in patients with very large infarcts.

Rehabilitation is a most forgotten part of the stroke, it should be started as early as the stroke onset and gradually intensified according to the patient's general improvement over a period of time.

Stroke prevention is vital and requires strict control of the risk factors. BP control is the most important measure. Secondary prevention include antiplatelet or anticoagulation as per the requirements and the rigorous control of BP, dyslipidemia (to less than 100 LDL) and abstinence from smoking.

We need more centers to treat strokes as our thrombolysis rate is still less than 5% of all acute stroke. Awareness of stroke symptoms and acute stroke treatment among health care providers are most important to avoid delays in instituting acute stroke therapy.

Telestroke and telemedicine facilities should be utilized to increase the number of patients receiving thrombolysis.

From the Editors Desk

Dear friends,

The Chattisgarh tragedy is dominating the medical headlines this month. At this time, it is believed that Ciprofloxacin tablets contaminated with Rat Poison caused the post sterilization deaths. State IMA has issued a strong letter condemning the inadequacy of the existing quality control measures that are expected to monitor over 64,000 available medicines, and have formed an expert committee to study the situation in Kerala.

Every tragedy brings along with it a learning opportunity, and this would be a time to introspect about our profession.

The loss of patients' lives in Chattisgarh was tragic. In addition, as doctors, we have every right to be upset with the media for initially calling Dr Gupta a 'killer doctor'. While this will not seem fair to us doctors, the way we see it, (IMA has strongly condemned this action) we must also pause for a moment and consider how the public sees us. Unfortunately, in the real world, as team leaders, whether we like it or not, we as doctors are ultimately deemed responsible for the quality of our staff, equipment and success or failure of the surgery or treatment that we administer. In our film industry, if a superstar acts in a badly scripted film, he or she gets blamed squarely for the failure, and no one blames the cameraman, light-boy, scriptwriter or director. A doctors' situation is not dissimilar.

When our working conditions remain suboptimal, it is only a matter of time before such tragedies happen, and the media and public, who may have placed us on a pedestal only the day prior, will be quick to drag us down to the depths of infamy. Clearly, even though Dr Gupta could not have possibly known that the tablets were substandard, he became a victim to this perception of the public.

In most other situations however, simple measures such as mandatory check lists prior to each procedure, and periodic quality improvement meetings with staff and administration,

can go a long way in preventing complications- and these measures really do not cost extra money.

We just have to wake up to the fact that the society looks up to us as team leaders, act responsibly and continue to have faith in our profession. Best regards,

Teaching Pearls 14 of 24
(This is part of an ongoing awareness series for road accident prevention. Please use this to educate teenagers and younger drivers in particular)

The Stop Sign

Do your Wheels Stop Turning When you Stop at an intersection?



As we enter a larger road from a side road, we are expected to stop our vehicle, look in both directions, and enter the main road cautiously and only if fully clear.

In western countries, a stop sign is kept at such intersections where our vehicle is expected to stop before proceeding.



According to Western Driving instructors, "THE WHEELS HAVE TO STOP TURNING" at the stop sign.

In our country, stop signs are non-existent, for reasons beyond comprehension.

Our vehicles, especially two-wheelers, have the habit of entering the main road at full speed, without even checking whether there is an oncoming vehicle in the same lane.

This is a dangerous road behavior, and has caused several fatalities in this part of the world.

Main Points

1. When entering the main road from a 'pocket road', STOP your vehicle (make sure your wheels stop turning), then look in both directions before moving forward.
2. While traveling on the main roads with several sideroads ('pocket roads'), be watchful for two-wheelers darting out at full speed on to your lane.
